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DEAR JACOB CENTER SUPPORTERS AND PARTNERS,

The year 2022 was a year of some amazing accomplishments. We were able to directly serve over 500 individuals in the Larimer County Community (and beyond). This includes some of our most vulnerable children and youth. Although there are increased needs for children, youth, and caregiver services, as last year Larimer County received over 5,500 new referrals of child abuse and neglect, the dedicated support of YOU – Our compassionate Community Partners and Donors - has allowed us to reach further than before.

When the county reached out needing additional support, we were able to answer and provide care. We continued to educate the community with traumainformed practices and by offering 12 Trust Based Relational Intervention TBRI® Caregiver series trainings for parents (foster and biological), community professionals (caseworkers and CASAs), and internal staff members. We also held evening connection groups, which allowed community members a time to be together and share their feelings of frustration and of hope.

This report is meant to serve as a review of the past year and what your caring contributions and partnerships have helped us achieve. None of what is written in these pages can truly measure the life

impact these services have made, the gratitude expressed by concerned caregivers, or the smiles on the children's faces when they find their place to glow. THANK YOU for creating a continued space for connection and growth.



CORE PROGRAMS

Jacob Family Services, Inc. d.b.a. The Jacob Center, which was founded in 1988 and incorporated in 1993, is a 501(c)3 non-profit agency that provides community-based support and connection for youth and families involved with (or at-risk of becoming involved with) the child welfare system and/or the juvenile justice system. Our programs include:



Youth and Family Coaching: A community based, resilience focused program serving children, teens, caregivers, and families in Northern Colorado. Coaches use a relationship-based approach and experiential learning opportunities to promote the development of resilience factors including connectedness, regulation, and mastery. Coaching visits typically occur once per week for 3-4 hours and last an average of 5-8 months. Coaching services include Youth Coaching, Group Coaching, Parent/Caregiver Coaching, and Specialized Family Coaching.

Trauma Treatment Coordination: Helps families understand and heal from the impact of complex trauma and navigate community resources while ensuring appropriate treatment needs are being met on a continual basis by different service providers. Also offers 24/7 support line for youth and parents involved in the program.

Supervised Visitation: A short-term service that allows children in out-of-home placement visits with their biological parents and/or other family members while being supervised by a trained staff member. The staff focus on helping parents develop parenting skills and attain treatment goals.

Trust Based Relational Intervention® (TBRI®): TBRI® is a holistic, attachment-based, trauma-informed intervention that is designed to meet the complex needs of vulnerable children. TBRI® uses Empowering Principles to address physical needs, Connecting Principles to address attachment needs and Correcting Principles to disarm fear-based behaviors. Training is intended for Caregivers and professionals and facilitated by an internal Jacob Family Services, Inc. TBRI® Practitioner.
